


OPEN SPACE EDUCATION

Thank you for continuing to work together with us to create this positive change. We truly appreciate your support!



MEET SYDNEY: AN OPEN SPACE SUPERSTAR

Sydney was homeschooled before her family moved to Richmond during her 4th grade year. After enrolling at J.L. Francis Elementary, her mom noted that Sydney didn't have any accessible school-based programs that nurtured her love for art and nature. She began a search to find something to help fill the void.

Things changed when they discovered OSE. Sydney's first introduction to OSE was the GIVE + TAKE: Nature-Based Art program, and she's taken every program offered since! Now in middle school, Sydney has used some of the techniques and skills she learned during those programs to further explore. She's particularly proud of the fledgling business she created by crafting nature-inspired textiles and jewlery to sell.

MEET ANDY: AN OPEN SPACE SUPERSTAR

10-year old Andy (right) attends Patrick Henry School of Science and Arts. His mother enrolled both Andy and his younger brother, Asa (lower left), in OSE programs to nurture their love of hands-on activities and the outdoors, but she wasn't expecting some of the other benefits that surfaced for them along the way.

Though Andy was the oldest student in some of the programs he participated in, it gave him an opportunity to serve as a model for younger students and build new leadership skills. He learned new artistic techniques, and with encouragement from staff, explored his creativity and developed a style of his own. Andy now loves learning about the work of other artists, and continues to draw inspiration from exposure to new works and materials.

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT

FUNCTIONAL CERAMICS: FROM PLANTING TO

EATING is a unique 6-week educational experience, in partnership with RPS middle schools, that combines elements of nature-based learning, art education, plant cultivation, and food justice. Held outside at Fonticello Food Forest, this program aims to empower young people to understand the importance of sustainable food systems and healthy food choices.

The program starts with students learning about the art of ceramics and how to create functional pieces such as planters and dinnerware. Throughout the program, students plant, care for, and harvest their own vegetables and herbs with the guidance of community farmers and activists. Participants use the ceramics they made as planters. The program culminates in a final feast, where students prepare and serve a meal using the ingredients they grew and the dinnerware they created.

Food justice is a holistic view of the food system that sees healthy food as a human right. Students learn about the disparities that exist in access to healthy food and the importance of supporting local, sustainable food systems. This program is designed to educate and inspire the next generation of food justice advocates, empowering young people to make informed food choices that promote health and sustainability for themselves and their communities



PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT


GIVE + TAKE: NATURE-BASED ART is a unique offering by Open Space Education that combines art education and nature-based learning. The program is designed to amplify abilities and create breakthroughs in youth by helping students connect to the natural world through creativity and recognize their interconnection with each other.

The program consists of weekly sessions that are led by professional teaching artists. Each session is structured to be hands-on, immersive and experiential, allowing students to develop new skills and enhance their relationship with the natural world. The program also provides opportunities for students to learn from each other and develop their social-emotional skills.

Open Space Education is dedicated to providing equitable access to its programs, which is why the GIVE + TAKE: NATURE-BASED ART program is offered tuition-free in partnership with Richmond Public Schools. The program helps to address the unequal distribution of nature and arts experiences along lines of race and income and ensures that all students, especially those in disadvantaged communities, have access to the benefits of being in nature and engaging in art education.


83%
